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"Don't you get me wrong, I only want to know", sung by Judas in the title number, sets the tenor of this work. In no way can the show be called religious. The fact that it chooses the last week of Jesus Christ's life (before the resurrection) as its' subject matter does not ipso facto lead it along the path of intellectual pontification.

Judas is cast in the role of an everyman, and it largely through his eyes that we watch the inevitable march of events. Those who quibble over the interpretation of the part are failing to acknowledge the eternal struggle between logic and faith. The relationship between Jesus Christ and Judas is central to the story.

However long one may argue or discuss the merits of the lyrics, a musical work stands or falls on its music. Andrew Lloyd Webber's score is probably the only work written in 'pop' terms which can stand up to the term opera. The fact that the show has been defined as a rock-opera by most savants is a tribute few other works can claim. Originally issued as a Decca record set, it broke all sales figures for L.P's; even the Beatles' 'Sgt. Pepper' paled in comparison. Rave reviews made comparisons to Bach's "St. Matthew's Passion", and Handel's "Messiah". Whatever ones own thoughts may be — the work will remain a milestone of considerable stature along the road of modern music.

Informed opinion about any production can only come from those who have witnessed it. In the case of "Jesus Christ Superstar" one can only record the amazing success with which it has played and the thousands who continue to besiege the box offices wherever it is staged. It has been a phenomenal leveller — people of all ages and walks have lavished praise on it. What more can one say!







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EXHIBITION OF PHOTOGRAPHS IN THE FOYER.

THE EVERYMAN EXHIBITION.

To be presented with 15 profound quotations from the Medieval Mystery Play Everyman and asked to illustrate each one photographically was a rather daunting challenge. I was faced with this by Fr. Cyril Farrell, O.S.M., Editor of the annual religio-cultural review Everyman, who thought that such a set of pictures would be an ideal central feature for the 1969 publication — so he said, with a charming smile and a twinkle in his eye.

My involvement with the Lyric Theatre gave me the idea of a dramatic interpretation - to cast the play was the answer. Each actor was asked to show by facial expression and gesture but without the aid of spoken dialogue the character, mood and feeling that each text demanded. Complications of setting and costume were eliminated by photographic concentration on face and hands, blacking out all else. But the character Everyman posed special problems. He had to journey through life from youth to advanced old age, his apparel had to was easy but make-up tends to be highlighted by the camera, giving falsity to the character. Fortunately Louis Rolston, my Everyman, had a great growth of beard for a part he was playing in the current production at that time in the Lyric. So at the end of the run and before the beginning of the next - 3 days in all - old Everyman was photographed. Portrayal of the lonely and piteous creature was achieved by the aid of the beard, acute-angled lighting, but mainly by the supreme concentration and great talent for characterisation displayed with incredible conviction by Louis. After careful checking that each print was of acceptable standard, the beard was shaved off and a more relaxed and happier Everyman showed the good times of you.h.

My sincere thanks to Loui Rolston and my other fellow actors who cooperated so willingly for many hours into many nights, after giving evening performances in the Lyric — also to my friend, the very professional photographer, Lionel Salem, for solving the problem of presenting the quotations and cast-list.
